#### The main barriers to educational achievement faced by eligible pupils in our school:

- Low aspirations of some disadvantaged families, regarding academic and career goals and expectations leading to limited life experiences for the children;
- Increasing number of English as additional language (EAL) families and families where English is the second language spoken in the home - some with limited understanding of the education system;
- Parental engagement can also act as a barrier to learning, engaging hard to reach families and ensuring regular attendance. Broken family structures - family stress and low resilience;
- Increasing Safeguarding and welfare issues which may lead to Social Services involvement.
